

Important English Rules With Examples

What Are the Most Important Rules in English Grammar?

Before you learn each rule, it helps to know why grammar matters. Grammar lets you share your ideas in a clear way. It also helps you avoid mistakes and confusion. Whether you are new to English or trying to get better, these simple rules will help you build strong, correct sentences.

Why Learning Grammar Rules Matters

- - Helps you speak and write clearly
- Makes your writing better
- Helps you avoid simple mistakes
- Makes you feel more confident when you speak
- Helps you prepare well for tests.

1. Subject–Verb Agreement

Basic Rule

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A singular subject uses a singular verb.

- A plural subject uses a plural verb.

Examples

- Singular: The dog **runs** every morning.
- Plural: The dogs **run** every morning.

Common Mistake

- ❌ People is excited.
- ❌ People are excited.

2. Sentence Structure Rules

A sentence is complete when it has:

- a subject,
- a verb,
- and a full meaning.

Examples

She dances.
He teaches English.
Stop! (Subject understood: **you**)

Basic Sentence Pattern (S + V + O)

- John loves music.

3. Consistent Verb Tenses

Basic Rule

Do not mix verb tenses when actions happen in the same timeline.

Correct vs Incorrect

- ☒ She was cooking when I arrived.
- ☒ She was cooking when I arrive.

4. Use of “Do/Does” and “Was/Were”

These helping verbs form questions and negatives.

Present Simple

- I / You / We / They ☒ do
- He / She / It ☒ does

Past Simple

- All subjects ☒ did

Examples

- He **does** his homework every day.
- They **did** the project yesterday.

5. Correct Use of Have / Has / Had

Examples

- I **have** a dog.
- She **has** a beautiful smile.
- They **had** breakfast early this morning.

These verbs show **possession** or **completed action**.

6. Punctuation Rules

Capitalization

Always capitalize:

- Proper nouns
- The first word of every sentence

Examples

- India is a beautiful country.
- My friend John lives in New York.

End Punctuation

Every sentence must end with:

- a period (.)
- a question mark (?)
- or an exclamation mark (!)

Examples

- Where do you live?
- My dog is very clever!

7. Apostrophes for Possession & Contractions

Possession

- The boy's dog. (one boy)

- The boys' dog. (many boys)

Contractions

- it's = it is
- its = belongs to it
- you're = you are
- your = belongs to you

8. Correct Use of Articles (A, An, The)

Rules

- Use "a" before consonant sounds.
- Use an before vowel sounds.
- Use the for specific or known items.

Examples

- a university (starts with "yu" sound)

- an elephant
- the sun

9. Prepositions (in, on, at)

Examples

- in the morning, in India
- on Monday, on the table
- at 5 pm, at school

10. Pronoun Agreement

Rule

Pronouns must match the noun in **number** and **gender**.

Examples

- Every student must bring **his/her** notebook.
- The children finished **their** homework.

11. Avoid Double Negatives

Examples

- ❌ I don't want **no** help.
- ❌ I don't want **any** help.

Double negatives change the meaning and should be avoided.

12. Active vs Passive Voice

Preferred Use

Use **active voice** to make sentences clear.

Examples

- The cat ate the fish. (Active)
- The fish was eaten by the cat. (Passive)

13. Correct Placement of Modifiers

Examples

- ❌ She almost drove her kids to school every day.
- ❌ She drove her kids to school almost every day.

Modifiers should be close to the word they describe.

14. Forming Questions Correctly

Rule

Switch the **subject** and **helping verb**.

Examples

- You are coming. ☐ Are you coming?
- She can swim. ☐ Can she swim?

Summary Chart: Important English Rules

Rule Type	Example
Subject-Verb Agreement	The dog runs. / The dogs run.
Complete Sentences	She sings.
Consistent Tenses	I was eating when he called.
Articles	a cat, an eagle, the moon
Prepositions	on the table, at night
Apostrophes	the girl's bag
Pronouns	Everyone did their work.
